The original company strength was 187 enrollees and three officers. The officers were Byron A.

COMPANY 3308, CCC, was formed at Fort George G. Meade, Md., August 27, 1935 and was transferred to the present camp site August 28, 1935, under the command of Byron A. Glover, Capt., Air-Res. The company arrived at Mauch Chunk, Pa., at 4 p. m., and was transferred from there by bus to Camp P-153, Nesquehoning, Pa. None of the camp building had been finished and the brush was so thick that it was impossible to see one building from another.

Glover, Capt. Air-Res., Commanding, Robert W. Lockridge, 1st Lieut. Inf.-Res., and Norborne P. Beville, 2nd Lieut. Inf.-Res.

During the past one and one half years a great many changes have taken place. Roads and walks have been built, buildings have been remodeled and decorated, in addition to various buildings having been constructed.

The Administrative Personnel of the company has been increased or changed at various times. Five Medical Officers have been assigned and transferred or relieved. Lieut. Beville has been promoted to 1st Lieut. On August 22, 1936 the command changed from Capt. B. A. Glover to 1st Lieut. Robert W. Lockridge. During the last part of October 2nd Lieut. Thomas M. Walton, Jr., FA.-Res., was transferred to the company. Dr. H. Wesley Harrison was appointed to the company as Educational Advisor on September 4th, 1936.

The Sunergoi Club of Mauch Chunk, Pa. in charge of Flood Relief during March, 1936 requested the company to furnish trucks to collect food and

clothing, and transport them to the stricken areas. Three trucks were furnished and were in charge of Lieutenant Beville.

The major competitive sport is baseball and the company was given a trophy for being the best Veteran Company in the district. The trophy was presented by Chaplain Brundick of District No. 1, representing Colonel Polk, Commander of the same District.

One death has occurred since the formation of the company. The member was James Gibbs, Colored Veteran, who died of heart failure July 7, 1936.

The Religious work is well cared for under the supervision of Chaplain William March and Chaplain Elias Auger, assisted by nearby clergymen. Bible class, Sunday school, Prayer meetings and song services are also held by enrollees.

Educationally, the situation for Colored Veteran Camp is excellent. Dr. H. Wesley Harrison, the Adviser, ably fits every program to the needs of class and the needs of individual Veterans.
