COMPANY 3315, CCC, Camp A-2-Pa., is located on the Artillery Target Range, Military Reservation, at Tobyhanna, Pa. The first cadre of men arrived on August 7, 1935, consisting of ninety-nine CCC men under the command of Captain James J. Snee, Inf.-Res. They came from Company 302 at Analomink, Pa., and consisted of key men for the newly organized Company 3315. Two days later, 104 rookies came from the Greensburg, Pa.,

occupancy. For the first three months the company used the kitchen and latrines of the National Guard Camp and their tents occupied the territory in the vicinity of these buildings.

Several work projects have been undertaken and other tentative projects are planned which will keep men busy for years. Many miles of road have been built. One of these from Route 611 to the camp area is 16 feet wide with 5 foot shoulders and has a sub-base crushed rock of a depth varying from 1 foot to 6 feet. It will have a bituminous covering when finished and withstand the ravage of the heaviest vehicles.

During the heavy flood period in late March, 1936, practically the whole company was moved en masse into Wilkes-Barre, Pa., and encamped in the American Legion Home. Two floors were used as barracks and a temporary field kitchen was set up outside. For ten days the men under the direction of Captain Snee and the technical force directed traffic, distributed Red Cross supplies, and participated in general clean-up. That their work was appreciated

was shown by the large number of letters of commendation received from city officials and other organizations of the city of Wilkes-Barre.

The company baseball team, managed by John Simko, Company Clerk, made a fine showing in finishing as runner-up for honors, missing, by the margin of one game, the championship of a strong local league.

The religious life of the company is well cared for by visits of the Sub-District Chaplain and the services of nearby ministers. A Tri "C" Bible Class has recently been started in camp.

The company is fortunate in that it has an entire building set aside for educational work and a large building suitable for basketball, except when the temperature is too low. A well rounded program of education and recreation has been established. The company has the service of a 16 MM sound movie machine for weekly movies and educational pictures.

Since Captain Smith took command of the company in August, 1936, numerous improvements have been put into effect.
