COMPANY 5446 was made up and conditioned at Fort Barrancas, Florida. Men were recruited from the state of Mississippi, and all were natives of that state with the exception of a few men who had previous experience in the C.C.C., and were sent with the company as a nucleus for the company overhead. The company left Fort Barrancas on a special train on May 25, 1936, under the command of Captain Samuel A. Marshall, Jr., Cav.-Res., with Lieutenant E. Olin Huff, Inf.-Res., as Adjutant.

The company arrived at Ridgway, Pa., on the morning of May 27, and were met at the depot by trucks from Company 1358, which at that time occupied Camp S-101. Harry W. Woolhandler, 1st Lt. Med.-Res., was assigned to the company as Camp Surgeon, and Robert R. Watkins was assigned to the company as Educational Adviser.

Although a great amount of Forestry work had been done by Company 1358, which had occupied the camp for nearly three years, Company 5446 has greatly aided in the completion of work projects since its arrival. The work record of the camp includes 25 miles of truck trails, 27 miles of foot-trails, 2,000 acres of tree and plant disease control, 40 miles of roadside cleanup, the planting of 85,000 trees, construction of 40 small dams, and the construction of numerous feeding shelters for small game.

The largest single project has been the construction of a recreation dam which has recently been completed by members of Company 5446. The dam, which was built at the State Game Protectors Training School at the headwaters of Manner's Run, will

be for public recreational use, and will also be used for study by officials of the State Game Commission and the State Game Protectors. The artificial lake covers 14 acres of land, and will be stocked with rainbow trout. The area around the dam has been beautifully landscaped under the direction of the camp engineer, John Fuller. Under his direction also, clusters of every plant native to Pennsylvania have been planted around the Training School to be used for training Game Protectors.

The education of the enrollees began upon their arrival at the camp. A tour of the entire work projects was sponsored by the project superintendent, Mr. I. J. Meenan, who loaded the company on trucks and toured every work project. Classes in literacy, academic, and vocational subjects were arranged for the new company upon its arrival, and a large percentage of the men have and are now participating in the educational activities. The most successful class is the soldering class, in which members have been taught the principles of soldering, and have made various small articles.
