ON MAY 30, 1933, Company 366, 205 strong arrived at Allenwood, Pa., from Fort Washington, Maryland, where they were organized. The camp location is 16.7 miles south of Williamsport, Pa., in the valley known as "White Deer". The elevation is 860 feet above sea level. The first Company Commander was Capt. Ralph E. Hill, C.A.C., who was relieved a few days later by the present Commander, Captain Frederick S. Lee, 313th. F.A. The company arrived in the rain, pitched tents in the rain and spent the first night

in the rain. Under conditions as unfavorable as these, the pioneer enrollees laid the corner stone for Camp S-125.

This company has made an enviable record in social, recreational, educational and athletic activities. Much attention has been given to the leisure time of the enrollee by having frequent dances, movies and dramatic performances. The camp baseball and basket ball teams have created for themselves records of which the company is justly proud, winning titles in both sports in the 1935-1936 seasons.

Recreational and social activities have proved to be a form of education for the men, but realizing the necessity for a definite program of study in the camps, the Department of the Interior, instituted a system in April, 1934, for the training of the enrollee in elementary, vocational and high school studies so that he might be better fitted to take his place as a citizen. The educational program of this company has grown rapidly, and has as its outstanding feature, the Vocational School at Williamsport, Pennsylvania, for CCC men. Twenty-three men from Camp S-125, are

in attendance there in Electric Welding, Woodworking and Machine Shop Practice. The school is open to all eligible enrollees and has as its ultimate objective, job placement.

In educating the enrollee, his spiritual training is not over looked. The Rev. Squire Schofield of Muncy, Pa., and Lieut. James J. Corbett, Chaplain, hold weekly religious services for the men and have unselfishly given of their time for the moral betterment of the company.

Captain Frederick S. Lee, 313th. F.A. is the commanding officer of the 366th Company, with First Lieut. Charles D. Van Wickle, FA-Res., First Lieut. David J. Becker, Engr.-Res. and First Lieut. Archie Cohen, Med.-Res., as his aides and Mr. Francis P. Cummings as Educational Adviser.

Camp S-125 has, by its conduct and associations with the citizens of the nearby communities, attained a high place in the public mind, and the enrollees are as welcome in the neighborhood as are the many weekly visitors in Camp S-125.
