A royal welcome was accorded the company by Captain James E. Morgan, Commanding Officer of the company whose camp the enrollees were to occupy.

The company was soon settled in the new location, and the following day the men were turned over for their first day's work in the Pennsylvania State Forest. under the expert direction of Mr. I. E. Lauver, the Project Superintendent. Most of the men, while still inexperienced, and in spite of the harrowing tales of sub-zero weather, are determined to make a good record.

Captain James A Hart, the Commanding Officer, whose home is Petersburg, Tennessee, has been connected with the Civilian Conservation Corps at various times since June, 1933, at which time he went out as Junior Officer of Company 1472, headquarters of which was at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia. Later that year he assumed command of that company, and since has been

in command of five other companies of District A of North Carolina, from the last of which he was called to organize and command Company 5471.

Lieutenant C. P. Sandifer, the Junior Officer of the company, whose home is Rock Hill, South Carolina, is also a veteran of Civilian Conservation Corps service. His first duty was with Company 1419 at Carrabelle. Florida, and since that time has been on duty with two other companies in the Fourth Corps Area.

Lieutenant Aaron Grossman, Camp Surgeon, was assigned on the arrival of the company in Pennsylvania. His home is New York City, and he has been active in the services of the Civilian Conservation Corps since October 22, 1935, serving with Company 2329 until his transfer to Company 373 in September, 1936.

Mr. J. E. Lauver, Project Superintendent, whose home is Mifflintown, Pennsylvania, came to the company from Company 360. He has been connected with Civilian Conservation Corps activities since June, 1933
