COMPANY 2328 was organized on June 27, 1935, at Shelocta, Pennsylvania. Eighty-one enrollees and two officers were transferred from Company 1301, CCC, Home, Pa., to form the organization commanded by Capt. Henry E. Reed. His executive officer was 1st Lt. William J. Morgan, FA.-Res. On the same date Dr. Howard Hellman, M.D., reported for duty as Contract Surgeon, and on July 1st, 1st Lt. Peter H. Hazes, USMGR., reported for duty and assumed his duties as mess officer.

The camp is located on the Kimmel farm about one mile west of Shelocta, Indiana County, Pennsylvania. The company was housed in tents until the buildings were completed. The company moved into the new buildings about the fourth day of November, 1935.

The work project is under the direction of the Soil Conservation Service, the object being to check and control erosion on the farms of the Crooked Creek Watershed. Outstanding work accomplished consists of the planting of 946,800 trees on 791 acres, construction of 9,940 rods of fence, digging of 30,000 feet of diversion ditches, quarrying and crushing of 550 tons of limestone, and the construction of 71 check dams.

During the March flood disaster the enrollees worked hard and long in an effort to relieve suffering in the flooded areas. Outstanding was the operation of a soup kitchen and first aid station at North Vandergrift, Pennsylvania. Hundreds were fed and given medical treatment, and the work of Captain Henry W. Reed, former Company Commander, in enforcing sanitary rules in the area was outstanding. Under the direction of 1st Lt. William J. Morgan, ten trucks were

operated day and night for six days hauling food, blankets, and medical supplies into the flooded areas. After the flood emergency had passed the entire company was taken to Apollo, Pennsylvania, where the men worked ten days cleaning homes, churches, public buildings, and streets.

In the field of education Company 2328 has offered to the enrollees a very varied program. Outstanding in the educational work has been the publication of the monthly magazine the Stockade, a recent issue receiving a four star rating from Happy Days.

The company garden which was planted and cared for by the class in gardening produced over one hundred and fifty dollars worth of vegetables for the company mess. The pride of Company 2328 is the new educational center which consists of a reading room, two fully equipped class rooms and a work shop.

Company 2328 has enjoyed cordial relations with the people of the surrounding communities, the people and officials of the borough of Indiana cooperating with the officers and the enrollees in an excellent manner.
