On MAY 18, 1933, CCC Company 364 was organized at Fort Washington. Md., with thirty-four men under the command of First Lieut. George Kernan. One hundred and fifty-one men were added to bring it to the one hundred and

The educational program was started in May, 1934, with Hiram Wolf as Educational Adviser, assisted in teaching by Captain Clark, Lieutenant Claybourne, Dr. Benz, Mr. Deliquanti, Educational Adviser, Mr. Clendennin, Mr. Long, Mr. McEvilla, Mr. Harrison, and Mr. Bayne, completed the staff till October, 1935, when Mr. Joseph C. Ruddy, Educational Adviser, assumed his duties. Mr. Alfred Sadusky, Educational Adviser, assumed his duties January, 1936. Mr. B. Ralph Summer, present Educational Adviser, reported for duty on July 24, 1936. The present educational program reaches every man in camp.

Recreation enjoys equal popularity. A dam was built for swimming, and teams in baseball, volley ball mushball, bring out all the boys. Hiking clubs have

a definite part in the program, and boxing, basket ball, and wrestling are part of the regular schedule, as are ice hockey, skating, skiing, and sliding. All types of indoor games are provided as a part of the recreational program. The library of only thirty-five volumes has been increased to five hundred books of selected fiction, history and non-fiction. Visual educational films are provided and in use. The first camp paper was published in February, 1935. The very best of motion pictures are shown in camp every week, and company dances are conducted regularly in Jersey Shore, Pa. All phases of the program do much to keep a high moral of the company.

Company 364 was not slow to answer the call for help at the time of the flood, March, 1936. The entire company was quartered in the armory of the National Guard in Williamsport and for weeks the men spent themselves in the noble work of bringing order out of chaos. With a smile and a cheer, the spirit of the 364th, the company tackled a job that had to be done and did it with credit to themselves and the CCC.
