1st Sgt. S. Hook, U.S.N.R., assumed the duties as  
 2nd in command and was assigned as adjutant,  
 transportation and Camp Exchange Officer.

ON JUNE 26, 1935, a  
 company of ninety-  
 five men under the com-  
 mand of First Lieut. Hugh  
 O. Saeger, F.A.-Res., left  
 the Company 340, Livonia,  
 Pa., and established Com-  
 pany 2324 CCC, upon the  
 site along the Pennsyl-  
 vania Highway Route 45  
 at the point 12 miles west  
 of Mifflinburg, Union  
 County, Pennsylvania.  
 Tents were erected and a  
 company mess established  
 under the direction of  
 Second Lieut. John P.  
 Leary, Mess Officer. On  
 July 2, 1935, Lieut. (jg)

By the end of August, Mr. Ray Hemenway, had  
 assumed his duties as the Project Superintendent.  
 Civil Engineer, Robert Smith, took up his duties on  
 October 14, 1935. Forester McKibben was trans-  
 ferred to other duties late in September and Mr.  
 Eugene Wolf became Forester. Mr. Wolf remained  
 in camp until early in May of 1936 when Mr. Sterling  
 D. Mummert became camp Forester. The company  
 moved from the tents into the permanent camp late  
 in September, 1935.

The forestry work has been carried on under the  
 supervision of the above named men and also Junior  
 Foreman, Francis E. Miller, Jay T. Koch and Leonard  
 McGuire. Mr. Harry K. Smull has been camp black-  
 smith, while Mr. Owen Yocum has served as me-  
 chanic. Squad Foreman, Palmer O. Smith and Samuel  
 Braucher have managed crews in the field and done  
 valuable work as local men familiar with the country  
 surrounding the camp.

Educational Adviser, Mr. Hamilton A. Nuss, has  
 been in camp since September 16, 1935, and has  
 served as director of educational and recreational

activities. Basketball, baseball and boxing have been  
 favorite recreational enterprises. The camp basket-  
 ball team, during 1935-36, held the Sub-District  
 championship.

The camp newspaper, "Joyce Kilmer Echo", was  
 first published on November 28, 1935.

The winter of 1935 and 1936, was a long cold  
 one with an unusually heavy snowfall. Practically  
 the entire enrollment did service in flood relief in  
 Sunbury, Pa., for a period of nearly a month during  
 March and April. Company 2324 was the first CCC,  
 outfit to go into Sunbury after the flood warning and  
 the call was sent out for help. Lieut. John P. Leary,  
 Jr., Company Officer and Mr. Ray Hemenway, Super-  
 intendent, led the first group of ninety-five men from  
 Joyce Kilmer into the flood area at Sunbury. Lieut.  
 Leary, resigned early in May to take a position in  
 civil life being replaced by Second Lieut. Oliver P.  
 Gillock, F.A.-Res. On October 5, 1936, Lieut. Oliver  
 P. Gillock was assigned to duties elsewhere. First  
 Lieut. Joseph T. Kolibash, Med.-Res., assumed his  
 duties as camp Medical Officer, September 20, 1936.
