COMPANY 308 was organized April 10, 1933, at Fort George G. Meade, Md., and arrived at the camp site S-59, better known as Ross Farm in the vicinity of McAlevy's Fort, on May 6, 1933.

The first commanding officer was Second Lieut. R. F. Sink, 34th Infantry who commanded the company until May 29, 1933. On that date he turned the company over to Capt. S. B. Over, Inf.-Res., who continued in command until June 15, 1933, when Lieut. Sink

the company over to Capt. F. K. Burket, Inf.-Res., who retained command until June 25, 1935, when the command was turned over to the present Commanding Officer Capt. L. W. Stanley, Inf.-Res.

On October 31, 1935 the company moved from Camp S-59 to Camp SCS-9 at Todd, Pa.

In March, 1936 the company was called upon to help clean up flood damage in Smithfield Pa., the men working a total of 3150 man hours and using several trucks.

The company received commendations from both the District and Sub-District Commanders for its work in Smithfield during the flood.

The company engages in athletics such as basketball, baseball, soft ball, touch football, tennis skating, swimming, quoits, pool, and other athletic activities.

The company has won the following championships: Sub-District Basketball 1935-36; Sub-League of Sub-District No. 4 Baseball 1936.

On July 24, 1934, the company was saddened by receipt of a telegram announcing the death of Joseph

P. Stebock at Walter Reed General Hospital from heart failure.

Regular planned courses in academic and vocational subjects are conducted and are determined by the needs of the enrollees and the demands for courses. The general plan followed is that if one enrollee wishes a course it will be given, if possible.

The company exhibited a panel at the Educational Advisers Conference in College Park, Md., which showed a graphic outline of a brief course in Business Law. The main features were exhibits of properly and improperly drawn checks, and samples of mortgages.

The work project at McAlevy's Fort was forestry work. At Todd the work is Soil Conservation.

A camp paper was organized and the first issue published in September, 1935. The publication was called the Seeger Sentinel in honor of Alan Seeger, a war time poet, who spent a great deal of time in the vicinity of the camp. When the company moved to its present site the name was changed to the Lone Sentinel.
