ON OCTOBER 4th and 5th, 1936, seven CCC companies of more than a thousand men were enrolled in the area of North and South Carolina. These recruits then reported to Fort Bragg, N. C., on October 6th, where Company 5472 was immediately organized. The men of the company were all South Carolina men with the exception of a cadre of nine whose homes were in North Carolina. The newly organized company was quartered in tents at the fort until October 21, 1936.

Capt. A. B. Culbertson

of Goldsboro, N. C., was placed in command of the new company. First Lieut. Charles W. Creighton of Greenwood, S. C., was assigned to the company as Junior Officer. A cadre of nine experienced CCC enrollees with two years CCC experience were selected and assigned to form the nucleus of the company's overhead.

On Wednesday, October 21, 1936, the company entrained for permanent encampment at Camp S-93, Analomink, Pa. After an orderly and uneventful trip North, the company arrived at East Stroudsburg, Pa., the camp's railroad, on Thursday evening, October 22nd at 5:00 p. m. and was immediately transported the remaining eleven miles to camp by truck. The first edition of the company newspaper appeared from the press on the second day and the entire group attended a college football game on the third day.

Upon the arrival at Camp S-93, the officer's staff was augmented by First Lieut. Natal G. Carabello, medical officer, who is a veteran in the camp having

served here for nearly two years and by Kehl Markley, Jr., educational adviser, a World War officer and former school and camp executive, who has had two years of CCC experience in his present assignment. Twelve local experienced men likewise joined the company upon arrival.

Camp S-93, one of the oldest and best known CCC camps in the Eastern district (having been established May 6, 1933), is located in the heart of the Pocono Mountain resort region in a sheltered and picturesque valley at the junction of Laurel Run and Brodhead's Creek. The camp fills a great need for the people of the county in helping to protect the valuable vacation land from the ravages of forest fires.

In addition to the fire protection given, the chief work projects of the company are: road construction and maintenance, fire tower and fire house construction, improvement cutting, roadside cleanup, plant disease control and tree planting.
