COMPANY 388 was organized on June 4, 1933 at Fort Washington, Maryland, and arrived at its first location, Camp S-65, Treaster Kettle, Centre Hall, Pennsylvania, on June 21, 1933, under the command of Capt. George W. Spotts, USMC, and Lieut. T. H. Allen, Inf. USA. On September 5, 1933, Capt. Roswell R. Boyer, Capt. CA-Res., present commanding officer, was assigned to the company, finally taking command on May 1, 1934.

On April 13, 1934, Mr. William S. Hull, was assigned to the company

as Educational Adviser, with additional duty at two other camps. He was finally made full time adviser of Company 388 on March 29, 1936.

The next move of the company was on May 14, 1934, when it was moved to Camp S-113, Reedsville, Pa. Another change that occurred was on August 3, 1936, when the company was split and half of it sent to Camp S-65, Swanton, Maryland.

Of the Junior Officers, none, with the exception of Lieut. H. H. Yokes, Inf.-Res., and Lieut. A. F. Leone, Med.-Res., stayed more than six months. Lieut. Yokes was first assigned to the company in May, 1934 and stayed until the company was split on August 3, 1935, accompanying them to Swanton, Maryland. Lieut. Leone was first assigned to the company in May, 1934, and with the exception of a few months that he was Sub-District Medical Officer, he remained attached to the company, finally, leaving the CCC in October, 1936.

Athletic achievements, consisting of basketball, baseball, soccer, boxing and track, the Annual Field Days held in the fall of '34, '35, '36, were most

notable and successful. In October, 1935, the track team took third place in an inter-Sub-District Field Day, held at State College, Pa. The baseball team and boxing team also have records to be proud of, even though no trophies were won.

Four enrollees have suffered death during the existence of the company. Alfonso Schwelgel and Charles Wagner died as results of auto accidents, while Robert Wischman and Russell Reed died of pneumonia.

The company had one of the best religious records in the District, services being held weekly by the Sub-District Chaplain and Civilian ministers. The Annual Harvest Home Services, held in October '35 and '36 by a visiting minister, Reverend H. C. Kleffel of Altoona, Pa., was one of the special events of religious significance.

The Educational Program under the direction of Advisor Hull, offered a great variety of subjects designed to meet the needs of everyone. The most outstanding groups are photography, leathercraft, and journalism.
