ON OCTOBER 1, 1935, Company 336 de-camped with one group of the men forming Company 2314, which is now located at Lamount, Pa., and the other group of the men coming to Indiantown Gap, Pa., forming Headquarters Forestry Company 336, CCC Camp S-141-Pa. with Captain Claude H. Marshall as Commanding Officer, and succeeded by Capt. Faimond H. S. Clay, Lieut. L. L. Bittenbender, Capt. George C. Hart. Lieut. L. L. Bittenbender is the present Commanding Officer.

The aims of Forestry

Company 336, CCC Camp S-141-Pa. as stated by Project Superintendent G. M. Inscoc are to protect fire barriers on both sides of the mountain, build and erect four fire towers on mountain sides, develop parking areas for tourists and visitors, and maintain and develop picnic grounds. Many bridges have been constructed, one with a steel span 30 feet in length planned by the camp engineer.

Educational aims are to develop a well rounded personality, to acquaint men with a knowledge of every day affairs, develop greater earning power, and to evaluate and appreciate recreational and leisure time activities.

In an effort to meet these aims classes are organized and maintained. The Educational Adviser Wallace J. Campbell is the man of the hour in all such activities.

The CCC has been one of the greatest factors in maintaining the religious life in the company. It stands for Christ, Church and Christianity and the men have aided in fostering this plan of work in every department of social activity. The Educational Adviser and

Elmore E. Keith are religious directors. The idea is expressed by an enrollee, Cornelious Henry, when he said "By having these meetings with people from all walks of life, including city treasurer Thomas B. Beale of Lebanon, "Pop" Kelchner, Scout for the St. Louis Cardinals, ministers and their choirs, camp officers, and enrollees, and their informal discussions after services, the boys have acquired a deeper reverence and want to do better things." Chaplain Wm. T. Brundick and Chaplain Elias Auger visit the camp periodically. Chaplain Wm. B. Marsh offers many religious suggestions for better living.

Religious work has also been augmented by the visiting of young men from Lebanon Valley College, pastors and their choirs, and civic leaders from nearby communities.

The aim of all athletic competition is to develop good sportsmanship. Many athletic units have been organized with a captain for each unit; baseball, boxing, volley ball, track team, and basket ball. Competition has been conducted in surrounding communities.
